There, she became a proud mother of two boys, Gadys Alegria and Hardy Lorenzo Alegria. Like so many of our partner families, her journey has been filled with both triumphs and challenges - the kind that test your strength but also shape your soul.

In 2000, Mildred and her family packed up and moved to Conroe, Texas, chasing family ties and a fresh start. Life, of course, had its own plans. Her marriage ended, her sons found their own paths, and Mildred faced seasons of heartbreak and perseverance that only made her faith stronger.



Through it all, Mildred never stopped working. She's done it all from factory lines to restaurant kitchens, from cleaning schools to polishing church pews. Today, she works for Metro Clean in the Montgomery School District, where she keeps Keenan Elementary shining bright. (If you've ever walked those hallways and thought, "Wow, this place sparkles," you have Mildred to thank.) On Saturdays, she cleans a local church because apparently five days of hard work just isn't enough for her generous spirit.

Now, let's talk about Mildred's roommates - the furry kind. She's a proud cat mom to a small army of kitties with big personalities: Dixie and Ghost rule the indoors, while Gruñón, Tabo, and two others patrol the outdoors like they own the place. Mildred's vision for her future home is simple but beautiful: a space where she can read, take walks, and enjoy quiet evenings surrounded by her beloved cats - and maybe one day, her cousin from Honduras, whom she hopes to bring to the U.S.
